 Charter schools are tuition-free public schools.

Charter schools are:

- Tuition-free
- Open to all students
- Publicly funded based on enrollment
- Held accountable for meeting state and federal academic standards



"Charter schools get more money than other public schools."

 ✓ On average, charters receive less public funding than traditional public schools.

Charter schools, and specifically CSIauthorized charter schools, are at a distinct financial disadvantage as they do not receive a proportionate share of K-12 property tax revenue.







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"Charter schools do not serve all students."

 Nationally, charters enroll more students of color and low-income students.

✓ Charters are held to the same standards as district-run counterparts.
